DA SEC. LAUREL LEADS FARMERS' TRADING CENTER TURN-OVER IN ROSALES

Department of Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel, Jr. led the inauguration and turnover of the multi-million pesos worth of agricultural trading center in Brgy. Tomana East, Rosales, Pangasinan on March 25, 2025.

APhp60 million project funded by the DA under the Enhanced Kadiwa Inclusive Food Supply Chain Program in cooperation with the Abono Partylist representative Hon. Robert Raymund Estralla III who donated the 8,000 sq. m lot, the project is expected to improve the profitability of the farmers as well as farmers cooperatives and

associations by transforming them into an empowered entrepreneur.

An activity that attended by around hundreds of farmers and vendors in the various municipalities of the 6th district of Pangasinan, the inauguration and turnover ceremony was highlighted with the unveiling and awarding of the certificate of turn-over to the municipality of Rosales headed by Mayor William Cezar.

In his message during the turn-over ceremony, Secretary Laurel undersocred the relevance of projects such as this trading center to increase the income of farmers while providing the consumers with fresh, accessible and affordable agri-products.

Seeing the potential of this DA project to improve the distribution and consolidation of agri products and commodities, Secretary Laurel vowed to establish another trading post in Pangasinan while granting the request of the LGU Rosales for a rice drying facility and a cold storage facility with solar power system.

BALUNGAO FARMERS' SUMMIT GATHERS THOUSANDS OF FARMERS

Over a thousand farmers gathered at the newly established Rice Processing Center III in Barangay Pugaro, Balungao, for a one-day Farmers' Summit on March 26, 2025.

The summit served as a platform to update farmers on agricultural development programs and initiatives facilitated by the Philippine Rice Research Institute (PhilRice), Philippine Crop Insurance Corporation (PCIC), Agricultural Training Institute (ATI), and private seed and fertilizer companies. The event was organized by the Local Government Unit (LGU) of Balungao through the Office of the Municipal Agriculturist.

Former Pangasinan Governor Amado "Pogi" Espino



graced the event as the Keynote Speaker, alongside Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I) Regional Technical Director for Operations Engr. Dennis Tactac, who represented Regional Executive Director John Pascual.

Among the event highlights

were discussions on Malusog Rice, crop insurance, and training opportunities led by PhilRice, PCIC, and ATI-RTC.

The Farmers' Summit remains a key initiative of the Balungao LGU, aiming to equip farmers with vital

DA CONDUCTS TECHNICAL BRIEFING ON SUBSIDIZED DRONE SERVICE TO BOOST RICE PRODUCTION

Keeping up with the latest technology in agricultural production, the Department of Agriculture-Rice Banner Program is conducting simultaneous technical briefing and actual service demo for its new program on agricultural drone assistance in rice clusters which will provide farmers drone-assisted farming operations.

Based on the guidelines discussed by Mr. Julius Briones and Ms. Leah Coloma of the DA-RFO I Rice Banner Program, the drone program hopes to provide farmers significant cost reduction on rice cultivation and improve efficiency by using cuttingedge technology such as the agri drone.

Through the said program, farmer-beneficiaries will receive a drone service voucher worth Php2,000 per hectare for drone-assisted farming operations. The Php2,000 shall cover pre-flight planning, crop establishment, nutrient management and pest and disease control. However, eligible farmer-beneficiaries may customize their service package by choosing to avail one or two or all of the offered drone services based on their specific needs.

To ensure swift and smooth implementation of the program, Municipal Agriculture Officers who participated in the briefing were encouraged by DA-RFO I to fast track the submission of rice cluster areas in their municipality covering 20 hectares and list of farmers who are eligible to avail of the program.

Farmers may visit their Municipal Agriculture Office to know more about the agricultural drone assistance program.

DA ILOCOS REGION STRENGTHENS RESEARCH COLLAB WITH AFRREDN THROUGH MOU SIGNING

Through its Research Division, the Department of Agriculture Ilocos Region effectively led a meeting with heads and representatives from various member institutions of the Agricultural and Fisheries Research, Development, and Extension Network (AFRREDN) on February 7, 2025, at the DA-RFO 1 conference hall.

A ceremonial signing of the MoU was conducted to strengthen research collaboration among member institutions. It serves as an entry point for research and extension proposals from the AFRREDN community for possible

funding by DA-BAR.

Other highlights of the meeting included the presentation of the approved AFRREDN guidelines and a detailed discussion of the activities planned for Fiscal Year 2025.

Participants also engaged in a participatory discussion to finalize the roles and functions of the AFRREDN committees including the Research for Development Committee, Extension and Transfer Committee, Institutional Support Committee, and Knowledge Exchange Committee.

AFRREDN, alongside DA -Agricultural Training Institute, serves as a vital partnership tool for stakeholders in agriculture fisheries for development and and extension (R4DE). effective network guarantees implementation of interventions through the collaborative effort of its members as well as ensure the quality of programs, services, and policies. Particularly, AFRREDN will spearhead prioritization and coordination of R4DE activities, programs and services to be undertaken at the regional level.



DA-RFO1, ILOCOS SUR UNVEIL KEY PROJECTS TO BOOST IRRIGATION, AQUACULTURE AND CROP PRODUCTION

The Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I), through its Ilocos Sur Research Center I (ISReC), in collaboration with the Provincial Government of Ilocos Sur, led the blessing and inauguration of a solar-powered water irrigation system, stocking of tilapia and hito fry at the newly built aquaculture farm, and Farmers' Field Day for the field validation of different FPA-registered fertilizers for optimum nutrient management of selected solanaceous crops in Ilocos Sur on February 6, 2025, in Bulag East, Bantay, Ilocos Sur.

The event was spearheaded by Ilocos Sur Governor Jeremias C. Singson, alongside DA-RFO I Regional Technical Director for Operations Dennis I. Tactac and Chief of the Research and Development Division, Dr. Gilbert Rabara. These activities served as a platform to highlight research and development innovations, particularly in irrigation, aquaculture, and vegetable production.

A joint initiative between ISReC and the Provincial Government of Ilocos Sur, in partnership with the Ilocos Sur Maharlika Wellness Center, the Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (BFAR), and private seed and fertilizer companies, these projects aim to enhance fish production and improve vegetable yields. The aquaculture project

is expected to boost the supply of tilapia and hito, while the Fertilizer Derby showcased various strategies to increase the productivity of key crops such as eggplant, tomatoes, and peppers.

Governor Singson expressed his gratitude to DA-RFO I and BFAR for their continued support of agricultural initiatives in Ilocos Sur. He also reaffirmed his commitment to advancing agri-fishery projects that contribute to food security and economic growth in the province.

Meanwhile, preliminary results from the Fertilizer Derby indicate no significant yield difference between increased or reduced fertilizer application rates. However, researchers emphasized the importance of proper timing in foliar fertilizer application to optimize yields while reducing production costs. Further economic analysis and assessment are underway to provide farmers with cost-effective and sustainable fertilizer management options.

These collaborative efforts underscore the commitment of DA-RFO I and its partners to sustainable agricultural development, equipping farmers and fisherfolk with innovative solutions to enhance productivity and profitability.





DA ILOCOS AWARDS PHP1.4M WORTH OF SUGARCANE PROCESSING FACILITY TO AMIA BENEFICIARIES IN PANGASINAN

The Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I), through the Adaptation and Mitigation Initiative in Agriculture (AMIA) Program, awarded a Php1.4 million-worth sugarcane processing facility to the San Pedro Mabini Farmers Agriculture Cooperative in Pangasinan, benefiting 70 farmer-members.

The facility aims to support the cooperative in expanding its 'basi' and sugarcane vinegar production, aligning with the AMIA CREATE framework, which promotes climate-resilient and market-oriented agri-fishery enterprises.

AMIA CREATE is an initiative under the DA's AMIA program, aimed at helping farmers in the Philippines adapt to climate challenges and become market-oriented.

The farmers also received training in business mind-setting, product packaging, and labeling.

The awarding ceremony was led by DA-RFO I AMIA's Jerico L. Valerio, with local officials in attendance.

Meanwhile, for the project to become sustainable, Department of Social Welfare and Development Secretary Rex Gatchalian who was also present in the event led the distribution of livelihood assistance in the form of cash to the vendors from the identified memebers of associations which shall serve as their seed capital in putting up their business in the trading center.

To further maximize the trading center, a training center located on the second floor is allocated to serve as venues during trainings and seminars to enhance their marketing skills and improving their product quality and enabling direct wholesale trading for higher profit and income.

DINGRAS LGU DONATES 19.6 HA TO DA-RFO1

Decades after the Department of Agriculture—Ilocos Norte Research and Experiment Center (DA—INREC) in Dingras, Ilocos Norte was established, the 19.64-hectare land it stands on is finally donated to the Department of Agriculture Regional Field Office One (DA—RFO1) during the signing of the deed of donation on February 17, 2025, at the DA-INREC Dingras Station, Cali, Dingras, Ilocos Norte.

Under the leadership of Dingras Mayor, Hon. Joefrey P. Saguid, the Local Government of Dingras granted ownership to the DA-RFO1 the 19.64 hectares of land in Brgy. Cali and Brgy. Saludares of Dingras, Ilocos Norte.


The signing of the deed of

donation was also highlighted with the turn over and release of the livestock hauling truck worth Php 3.5 million, to LGU Dingras as part of the INSPIRE project of DA under its Livestock Banner Program.

As stated by Ms. Melinda G. Calumpit, Assistant Chief of the DA-INREC, Dingras Station, "This (exchange) shows that when we work together, we can create aspirations that turn into reality."

Dr. Gilbert Rabara, Chief of the Research Division, highlighted the importance of the land being owned by the DA-RFO1, stating that infrastructure and enhancements will no longer be restricted; more buildings and laboratories can be built as ownership now falls solely on DA. In gratitude, Mr. Medardo Pablo, Chief of INREC-Batac emphasized, "The donation will undoubtedly benefit our farmers and other stakeholders not only in Ilocos Norte but also in the Ilocos Region."

The ceremony also highlighted the advantages of the donation and a tour around the station to show the scope of the land donated. In his acceptance speech, OIC - Regional Executive Director John B. Pascual stated, "This is a testament to what we can achieve when the government and local communities work together: a stronger, more sustainable agricultural sector for Ilocos Norte and beyond."





ARMYWORM HITS ONION FARMS IN PANGASINAN; DA ILOCOS LAUNCHES MASSIVE SPRAYING EFFORT

On the third week of January, over 49 hectares of onion farms in San Manuel, Pangasinan, were reported to have been infested by armyworm. The affected areas include barangays Santo Domingo and Lapalo.

The widespread presence of the pest was confirmed by the Department of Agriculture (DA) Ilocos Region's Onion Armyworm Surveillance Team, who immediately advised farmers to take action through massive pesticide

spraying.

To guide farmers, a demonstration activity using organic pesticides was held on January 26 in Santo Domingo, San Manuel.

After the session, 72 liters of pesticide—enough to treat 18 hectares—were distributed, with more supplies being delivered to cover the remaining affected areas in Santo Domingo and Lapalo.

The DA-RFO1 recommends massive spraying as compared to individual efforts, as it is more effective in preventing pests from hiding and reproducing. The advised best time for spraying is around 3 PM or later.

To prevent further damage, the agency plans to implement this spraying strategy across all the affected areas in the region.





DA ILOCOS BOOSTS PAFES IMPLEMENTATION THRU BENCHMARKING ACTIVITY

In a bid to enhance the implementation of the Province-led Agriculture and Fisheries Extension System (PAFES) across the Ilocos Region, the Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I), led by PAFES focal person and Planning Monitoring and Evaluation Division (PMED) Chief Ms. Doris Joy Garcia, spearheaded a benchmarking activity for key PAFES implementers from the region's four provinces.

The activity, conducted in collaboration with PAFES partnerimplementers from the Local Government Units, DA Attached Agencies and partner SUCs, aimed to gather valuable insights and best practices from PAFES-assisted enterprises in Sagada, Mountain Province. This initiative underscores the importance of strong partnerships among local government units (LGUs), funding institutions, and stakeholders to promote agricultural growth and development.

One of the key sites visited was the Sagada Heritage Village Bee Farm, a Learning Site for Agriculture managed by Magsasaka Siyentista Jayson O. Cam-ed. The bee farm, supported by ATI-Cordillera, showcases innovative honey production techniques and artificial insemination technology to breed superior queen bees. As an ATI Learning Site, the apiary benefits from training programs funded under PAFES to promote agri-entrepreneurship and capacity building.

The group also visited the shared service facility for coffee processing, operated in partnership with the Sagada Arabica Coffee Growers and Processors Inc. (SACGPO). This facility is a testament to the power of collaborative resource utilization, with support drawn from PAFES funding, the High Value Crops Development Program (HVCDP), and the Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP). The facility helps enhance the quality of Sagada Arabica coffee,

strengthening the competitiveness of local growers in both domestic and international markets.

Benchmarking activities such as this are vital as they allow LGUs to learn and adopt best practices from other provinces. By seeing firsthand how PAFES is successfully implemented elsewhere, stakeholders can identify strategies to maximize resources and strengthen agricultural development in their own areas.

The activity highlighted the importance of collaboration among LGUs, DA regional offices, and key institutions in advancing PAFES objectives.

With the knowledge and experiences gained from this benchmarking activity, the DA-RFO I and its partner institutions are optimistic about replicating successful models in the Ilocos Region, further driving agricultural transformation and rural development.

TICET TECHNO FORUM FROM ACROSS THE REGION

PANGASINAN FARMERS EYE HIGH-YIELD RICE VARIETIES AT DA'S TECHNO FORUM

Farmers explored highyielding rice varieties to increase their production in a field tour organized by the Department of Agriculture Ilocos Region during the Provincial Rice Technology Forum (PRTF) for the dry season on March 5.

The PRTF featured 11 agricultural companies that presented their latest rice varieties in Barangay Manaol, Pozorrubio, Pangasinan.

Participating companies included Leads Agri Ventures Corporation, TAO Seeds, Advanta Seeds Philippine Incorporated, Enviro Scope, Green and Grow Tech Incorporated, Seedworks, SL Agri-tech Corporation, Syngenta, Pro Agri Seed Corporation, Ramgo, and Bioseed.

Erwin Abayan, president of the Villanueva Farmers' Association, expressed his gratitude to have participated in the activity.

"Daytoy outcome na ti [PRTF] tadta napintas," Abayan said. "Adu iti nakita mi nga naduma-duma nga variety nga dapat maimula tapnu tumaas ti ani mi met nga mannalon." (This PRTF outcome is admirable. We saw many different varieties that we should plant to increase our harvest.)

The demo farms, established last November, provided farmers with

a firsthand look at the showcased 29 varieties' performance.

The PRTF, also known as the hybrid rice challenge, aims to identify high-yielding, suitable local varieties and increase farmers' awareness of hybrid rice.

Last year's wet season PRTF, held at the same site, saw Syngenta's RH9000 lead with 9.50 metric tons per hectare (MT/ha), followed by Bioseeds' Biorice Bonus with 9.12 mt/ha, Pro Agri Seed Corporation's LP2096 with 8.24 mt/ha, Leads Agri's Jackpot 102 with 7.47 mt/ha, and Bioseed's Biorice Zarap with 7.10 mt/ha.

OVER 300 FARMERS JOIN IN DA'S RICE TECHNO FORUM IN BANTAY, ILOCOS SUR

Over 300 farmers participated in the Provincial Rice Techno Forum (PRTF) held in Barangay Malingeb, Bantay, Ilocos Sur, on Friday, February 21.

The PRTF is an annual event of the Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office 1 through the Rice Banner Program. It aligns with the Masagana Rice Industry Development Program's objective of promoting hybrid rice to improve farmers' yield and income.

This year's forum in Ilocos Sur featured participation from 11 companies, including Bioseed, Seedworks, Syngenta, PASCo Leads, Advanta, GGT, TAO, Envro Scope, Bayer, and SL Agritech.

Farmers had the opportunity to observe 26 rice varieties cultivated on a 20.18-hectare demonstration farm owned by the Malingeb Dur-as Bantay Farmers Association.

All varieties were cultivated under uniform management from sowing to harvesting.

Through this forum, farmers will assess the best-performing varieties based on crop stand, panicle formation, and resistance to pests.

The DA-RFO1 has successfully established six trial sites across the region during the last wet cropping season of 2024 and four sites for the current dry season of 2024-2025.

DA-RFO1 HOLDS DRY SEASON PROV'L RICE TECHNO FORUM IN LA UNION

The Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office 1 continued its series of Provincial Rice Technology Forums (PRTF) for the dry season, holding the 4th leg in Bauang, La Union, on March 10, following the successful events in Pangasinan and Ilocos Sur earlier in the first quarter.

Each of the 25 hybrid varieties by ten participating seed companies was showcased in a 0.25-hectare demonstration plot. La Union farmers participated in a field walk to evaluate the crop stand, reaction to pests, and panicle formation.

Meanwhile, the forum also highlighted the results of the previous wet season's front demonstration site. Topping the list was Bioseed's Biorice Bonus with a yield of 13 metric tons per hectare (13 MT/ha).

The dry season Provincial Rice Technology Forum series will conclude with two events in the demonstration sites established in Ilocos Norte.













The Department of Agriculture - Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I), through its Agribusiness and Marketing Assistance Division (AMAD), and in coordination with the High Value Crops Development Progam (HVCDP), successfully facilitated a market linkage for tomato

farmers in Ilocos Region.

On February 25, the Sangjera Nagcarsuan Farmers Association, Inc. and Zanjera Naganakan Farmers Association, Inc. from Sarrat, Ilocos Norte delivered an initial 6,293.26 kilograms of tomatoes to Tosen Foods Incorporated in Meycauayan, Bulacan at an expected price of Php23.00 per kilogram. Succeeding deliveries will took place every Monday and Thursday since March.

The market linkage was made possible through close coordination of AMAD and the HVCDP where a meeting was conducted in October to firm up the marketing deal with Tosen Foods Incorporated.

The Provincial Government of Ilocos Norte extended its support to the farmers by providing logistical assistance through the awarded KADIWA truck, with a 50% subsidy on fuel expenses.

This initiative underscores DA-RFO I's commitment to enhancing market opportunities for local farmers, ensuring stable income, and strengthening the agricultural value chain in the region.

DA-RFO1 EMPOWERS FARMERS WITH FINANCIAL GRANTS FOR BETTER MARKET ACCESS

The Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO 1), through its Agribusiness and Marketing Assistance Division (AMAD), awarded financial grants to the Local Government Units (LGUs) of Bantay, Ilocos Sur, and Basista, Pangasinan on February 10, 2025.

OIC-Regional Executive Director Dr. John B. Pascual, together with Regional Technical Director for Operations Engr. Dennis I. Tactac, and OIC-AMAD Chief Ms. Rhoda Galban, led the turnover of the grants to the LGU representatives at the DA-RFO I Office of the Regional Executive Director. The Municipality of Basista, Pangasinan, received Php2 million for the agri-products delivery support to local farmers, accepted by Municipal Agriculturist Mr. Anthony F. Resultay. Meanwhile, the Municipality of Bantay, Ilocos Sur, was granted Php5 million for the farmers' transport vehicle and marketing logistics services, with Municipal Agriculturist Mr. Jordan R.

Briones receiving the check on behalf of the LGU.

For many farmers, the challenge is not just growing crops but also getting them to consumers while still fresh and in good condition. These grants will provide much-needed transport solutions, ensuring that high-quality, farm-fresh produce reaches markets faster, reducing losses and increasing profits for hardworking farmers.



DA-RFO1 RECEIVES PRIME HRM LEVEL 2 RECOGNITION, HONORS RETIREES, LOYALTY AWARDEES

16 DA-ATTACHED AGENCIES TO JOIN RCI-SRD



Strengthening collaboration and partnership in the Regional Convergence Initiative for Sustainable Rural Development (RCI-SRD) in Ilocos Region, 16 member agencies of the Regional Management Council (RMC) opted to join the Ilocos Regions Technical Working Group for wider access of government programs, projects and initiatives especially in the rural areas.

In the recently held 1st Quarter Meeting of the RCI-SRD Technical Working Group in Ilocos conducted at the 5th Floor Conference Room of the Department of Agriculture on March 28, 2025, Regional Convergence Secretariat, Ms. Irene Tactac announced the inclusion of 16 member-agencies of the RMC from the five original member-agency in the RCI based on RMC Resolution No. 1 duly approved by the RCI memberagency representatives.

RED John Pascual in his message reiterated the essence of converging efforts and resources among government agencies in the region to realize the goals and objectives of the convergence initiatives of the member agencies.

Recognizing the memberagency's efforts which made the Ilocos region to achieve the most number of convergence sites in the country, RED Pascual enjoined the proponents to apply for the DA's Civil Society Organizations accreditation to have a full access of the various development programs and projects that the agency members provide.

Meanwhile, while waiting for the approval of the convergence sites from the NCI-SRD, the RCI initiated some preparatory activities for the launching of the selected convergence sites in June where series of meetings shall

be conducted to discuss the program activities as well as the sourcing out of resources from the various convergence member-agencies.

The Agri-Enterprise and Agro Development Component of the technical working group is scheduled on the first week of April for field validation and needs assessment prior to the preparation of the project proposal for submission to the NCI-TWG on April 21, 2025.

Another salient activity of the NCI in April is the conduct of Strategic Communication Plan Writeshop to be held in Binalonan, Pangasinan to increase awareness about the programs and projects of the RCI-SRD with a field visit to the identified convergence sites with existing valid CADPs shall be conducted particularly in the convergence sites in San Manuel, Natividad, Balungao or San Nicolas.

DA-GAD TRAINS WOMEN ASSOCIATIONS ON MUSHROOM PROCESSING

Gathering 20 members of the Green Ladies Association of District 2 (GLAD2) of Burgos, Department of Agriculture Regional Field Office 1 (DA-RFO 1) through its Gender and Development (GAD) office, promoted product value-adding via Livelihood Training of Mushroom Processing for Women on March 11-12, 2025, at Burgos, La Union as part of 2025 Women's Month Celebration.

Following the community mushroom production training on August 2024, DA-GAD returns to Burgos to enhance the GLAD2's agri-preneurial capacity. Under the guidance of guest speaker and retired

DA GAD alternate-focal person, Ms. Filomena Bugaoan, the training involved processing mushrooms into different products such as the mushroom siomai, mushroom shanghai, mushroom chili oil, and mushroom polvoron.

For the second day, Ms. Maria Panela D. Gabriel of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), as part of the DTIs information dissemination campaign, educated the women agri-preneurs on consumer rights and responsibilities, emphasizing on awareness of the Philippines' consumer laws along with useful tips and tricks when buying different products.

This activity is greeted with from the women's enthusiasm led association bv Association President. Ms. Marilyn Calub, ensuring that the training will improve their production and income. It is as part of the department's support for agribusinesses and mutual partnership with empowered women, all joining hand-in-hand for the improvement of the country's economy and food security.

The other site for the training was in San Fabian, Pangasinan, on March 13-14, 2025, with members of Wondermoms Rural Improvement Club.









DA ASSESSES IMPACT OF GRANT AWARDED TO ASF-AFFECTED HOG RAISERS IN LA UNION

Under the joint coordination of the Department of Agriculture Regional Field Office 1 Regulatory Division, Livestock Banner Program, and Planning, Monitoring, and Evaluation Division (PMED), African Swine Fever (ASF) affected hog raisers from San Juan, La Union, and Rosario, La Union were interviewed and surveyed for the Results-Based Monitoring and Evaluation (RBME) on March 18-19, 2025.

A total of P755 000.00 was granted to hog raisers last 2024 whose livestock were culled during the height of ASF in 2023, allowing them to receive P5000.00 for each culled hog. The DA went back to check how these grants were used and if it helped the affected hog raisers.

These funds, according to the evaluation, were used by raisers to start again and were allowed to utilize the funds however they wanted. Some used

the indemnification funds for restarting their hog raising business, for family basic needs, as capital for other business ventures, or for crop production.





DA-GAD BRINGS LAB, OTHER SERVICES TO UMINGAN FARMERS

As part of the celebration of Women's Month this March 2025, the Department of Agriculture Regional Field Office 1 Gender and Development (GAD) office brings along the Integrated Laboratories Division (ILD) and the Registry System for Basic Sectors in Agriculture (RSBSA) office to provide technical laboratory services and registration services to the farmers of Umingan, Pangasinan on March 26, 2025.

The outreach offered services to some 30 farmers and farmer representatives invited by the Umingan Local Government Unit (LGU). Both women and men alike were able to acquire technical laboratory services such as soil analysis, animal health recommendations, providing bio-control agents (BCA's), and crop health diagnosis provided by the Regional Soils Laboratory (RSL), the Regional Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (RDDL), the Regional Crop Protection Center (RCPC), and the Regional Feed Chemical Analysis

Laboratory (RFCAL), respectively.

The event also provided an avenue for the farmers to register under the RSBSA or inquire about the status of their registration through representatives from the said office. The registry was also the determining factor for choosing Umingan, as it is the municipality with the highest

number of women farmers in Pangasinan.

The DA-GAD is committed to continuing its collaboration with different offices to continue providing outreach programs to different places, ensuring that the DA's services can reach every Filipino citizen in Region 1, both men and women alike.



DA-RFO1 CONDUCTS CY 2026 PLANNING WORKSHOP

To prepare for the implementation of the Department of Agriculture's (DA) programs and projects for Calendar Year (CY) 2026, the DA-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I) conducted a planning and budget proposal workshop on February 4–6, 2025, at Selah Vie Resort Hotel, San Ildefonso, Ilocos Sur.

The workshop gathered heads and planning officers from the DA's banner programs and other operating units to discuss priority programs and projects aligned with the DA's two-pronged goals: achieving food security and developing the agri-fishery sector into a profitable industry to boost farmers' incomes.

In her briefing and orientation, Ms. Irene Tactac, Project Evaluation Officer IV of the Planning, Monitoring, and Evaluation Division (PMED), outlined the process of project proposal submission, including the criteria for evaluating programs, projects, and activities to be prioritized for funding in CY 2026.

Key criteria for project evaluation include maximizing income, reducing poverty, increasing the income of farmers and fisherfolk, enhancing production, reducing import dependency, and promoting cost-reduction technologies.

Ms. Tactac also urged participants to consider key principles when proposing projects, emphasizing the importance of programmatic or outcome-based approaches, cost-efficiency, relevance, and readiness for implementation (shovel-ready projects).

To ensure comprehensive evaluation, each banner program and operating unit had the opportunity to present their proposed projects for review by PMED staff and Regional Technical Director for Operations Engr. Dennis Tactac. The reviewed proposals were presented at the Luzon-wide Plan and Budget Proposal Workshop on February 17–21, 2025, at Sola Hotel, Laoag City, Ilocos Norte.

DA-RFO1 LEADS REG'L MANCOM MEETING TO STRENGTHEN INTER-AGENCY COLLABORATION

The Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office I (DA-RFO I), as Chair of the Regional Management Council (RMC), spearheaded the conduct of the 4th Quarter RMC Meeting on February 11, 2025. Hosted by the Agricultural Training Institute-Regional Training Center I (ATI-RTC I), the meeting was held at ATI, Tebag, Sta. Barbara, Pangasinan.

The quarterly RMC meeting serves as a platform for discussing agency updates, development efforts, and collaborative initiatives in the agriculture sector. A key agenda of the session was the presentation of ATI-RTC I's profile, programs, and projects which is an integral part of the RMC's strategy to keep agencies informed of each host institution's contributions.

ATI-RTC I Center Director Dr. Jayvee Bryan G. Carillo led the presentation, highlighting the institute's initiatives in fulfilling its mandate as the training arm of DA. Among the key updates was the development of a Specialist Track Curriculum for Farmers in rice, corn, and high-value crops, aimed at enhancing knowledge and skills in training methods. Dr. Carillo also showcased ATI's various training programs aligned with DA's banner programs, covering different segments along the food value chain.

Another focus of the meeting was the presentation of each agency's agricultural development efforts, including key issues, 2025 action plans, and required support. A major challenge raised was the limited funding for fully implementing development initiatives. Other concerns included the need for improved facilities, logistics, training



assistance, and manpower supportissues that could be addressed through resource-sharing and strengthened collaboration among RMC member agencies.

In his message, DA-RFO I Regional Executive Director Dr. John B. Pascual underscored the importance of inter-agency cooperation in advancing the agriculture sector. He encouraged agencies to stay updated on DA's programs and emphasized that collaboration is key to addressing

challenges. He also relayed key directives from DA Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel, Jr. particularly in reinforcing efforts toward achieving national food security.

The RMC remains committed to fostering a cohesive and well-coordinated approach in delivering agricultural programs and services in Region I, ensuring that farmers and stakeholders receive the support they need for sustained growth and productivity.

DA DISCUSSES CY 2025 WORK PLANS, BUDGET WITH ATI-RTC

service to our customers," Ms. Romero said.

To further enrich the skills and knowledge of the trainees in the subject matter, several worthwhile and fun strategies were utilized aside from the discussions and oral recitation among the attendees including role play and fun game activities.

pivotal choice:
blueprints or blue waters? Driven by
a lifelong passion for aquaculture and
a desire to uplift his family, the son of
a fisherman decided to dive headfirst
into entrepreneurship, blending his
academic pursuits with his love for
the sea.

Growing up, Roy witnessed firsthand the challenges and potential of aquafarming. His family's livelihood depended on the fish his father tended as a renter and caretaker.

Seeing untapped opportunities, Roy envisioned a modern, sustainable fish farm that could boost incomes for local fishers. He believed innovative aquaculture systems, combined with Pangasinan's abundant water resources, held the key to transforming his community.

A turning point came when a friend introduced him to the Young Farmers Challenge (YFC) 2023. Roy applied, not expecting to win, but his vision and drive resonated with the judges. He secured not only the national YFC grant but also provincial and regional awards, providing crucial financial backing.

Roy's Uson Polyculture Farmstead Aquafarm, which began as a modest 200-square-meter crab-fattening operation, now spans 2.3 hectares. He implemented an ingenious aqua-polyculture system, raising milkfish (bangus), rabbitfish (samaral), and crabs symbiotically in two grow-out pens (15m x 20m x 3m). This diversified approach created multiple revenue streams from a single location.

The results were remarkable. Each




target regions.

three-month cycle yields 50,000 to 100,000 milkfish fingerlings, sold for 5 pesos each, and the same quantity of rabbitfish fingerlings, sold for 10 pesos each. His products are distributed throughout Regions 1, 2, and 3.

Roy's success attracted the attention of local exporters in Manila, restaurant owners, and individual buyers. He also forged a partnership with a UK-based shipping company, opening doors to potential exports to the Middle East.

To further enhance his operations, he invested in a refrigerated truck, enabling efficient delivery across his Starting with approximately 230,000 pesos, Roy has grown his business to an impressive 6 to 7 million pesos, including the value of his grow-out commodities and farm expansion. He also maintains a healthy emergency fund of 600,000 to 700,000 pesos.



funding to marketing assistance.
