Twenty-two out of school youths (OSY) from the municipalities of Banna, Solsona and Badoc in the province of Ilocos Norte received from the Department of Agriculture a total of 66 heads of cattle worth P4.4 million in a roll out activity today of cattle production project held at the Badoc Auction Market, Badoc, Ilocos Norte.

A project under the Agricultural Credit Policy Council (ACPC) that aims to provide livelihood opportunity for the out of school youths, the turn over ceremonies was led by DA Senior Undersecretary Domingo Panganiban together with Ilocos Norte 2nd District Representative Angelo Marcos Barba.

In his message during the awarding ceremonies, Senior USec. Panganiban reminded the out of school youth recipients of their obligations in the program that will help them sustain and expand their cattle raising enterprise.

"Alagaan ninyong mabuti ang mga bakang matatanggap ninyo ngayon at kapag naibenta na ninyo, gamitin ninyong mabuti ang mapagbentahan ninyo para ito'y lumago," Senior Usec Panganiban said.

Senior Usec Panganiban also highlighted various DA initiated projects in the province that is expected to further





revitalize and boost agricultural productivity in the province.

He mentioned the P13 million irrigation projects in Bacarra, P26 million irrigation project in Batac City as well as the P80 million KADIWA project for the provincial government of Ilocos Norte that shall provide marketing assistance to agrifishery products in the province.

Other projects that the good Senior USec informed is the P30million worth project to revive the operation of the National Foods Corporation and the P100 million investments for the improvement of the salt industry.

Meanwhile, Ilocos Norte 2nd District representative Angelo Marcos Barba and Governor Matthew Marcos Manotoc who was represented by Board Member Jonathan Torralba expressed their gratitude to DA for continuously providing agri development programs and projects in the province towards attaining its vision to have a safer, stronger and more progressive province.

Aside from the roll out cattle raising activity, the DA likewise distributed a total of P5.6 million in the form of hybrid corn and vegetable seeds as well as shallow tube wells.



Taking advantage of the presence of Senior Usec Panganiban, he was also invited to grace the distribution of the Rice Farmers Financial Assistance (RFFA) given to 250 rice farmer individuals in Dingras, Ilocos Norte who received from DA each an amount of P5,500 intended for their rice farming operations. Fuel subsidy discount vouchers were also distributed to corn farmer-recipients including hybrid corn seeds and agri infra projects.#

30 corn farmers in Pangasinan complete FFS to manage fall armyworm



Sixteen weeks (16) of learning together, doing things to enhance their technical know-how in planting corn with the help of the assigned agricultural extension workers in their area, 30 farmer-graduates completed the season long Farmer Field School cum Participatory Technology Development on the Management of Fall Armyworm on March 29, 2023 at Brgy. Pangpang, San Carlos City, Pangasinan.

In a field day and graduation ceremonies, the 30 farmer-graduates received their Certificate of

Completion from the DA headed by Regional Crop Protection Center's (RCPC) Chief Marivic Gambala and Regional Integrated Pest Management's Coordinator, Mr. Aries Magat together with Ms. Estrellita Jacaban, San Carlos City Agriculturist.

Graced by no less than San Carlos City Mayor, Julier Resuello, the farmer-graduates were encouraged to apply the learnings they have acquired from the training to enable them to increase their production and income in corn.

Assuring once more of the LGUs support and commitment towards improving the implementation of programs and projects under the agriculture sector in San Carlos, Mayor Resuello pledged his support in the provision of improved farm machineries and equipment to the farmers to improve their productivity and make them become more competitive in corn production.

Ms. Estrellita Jacaban, City Agriculturist of San Carlos shared the same insights with Mayor Resuello as she encouraged the farmer-graduates to be more pro-active in all the activities of the City Agriculture Office especially on projects such as the FFS-training for farmers.

Noting the benefits that the farmers could have acquired especially in reducing their production costs upon learning the effectiveness of bio-control agents in controlling corn pests in their farm, Ms. Jacaban called on the farmer-graduates to continue applying what they have learned and share it as well to their fellow farmers.

To sustain the usage of biocontrol agents in their farm, the DA through the RCPC provided various bio-control agents for the farmer-graduates such as trichogramma evanescens, beauveria bassiana and



earwigs which they may use in their farm to control fall armyworm and other corn insects in their area.

The FFS-PTD project is an activity of the Department of

Agriculture in collaboration with the Food and Agriculture Organization in partnership with the Local Government Unit of San Carlos City, Pangasinan.#



50-ha corn model farm field day held in La union, Pangasinan

Corn model farm in Pangasinan

The Department of Agriculture Regional Field Office 1 along with the local government unit of Villasis and Bayer CropScience conducted a 50-hectare Corn Model Farm Field Day at Barangay Barangobong, Villasis in Pangasinan.



About a hundred or more farmers from Villasis and nearby towns attended the activity that aimed at showcasing corn production using farmers' practice and site-specific nutrient management (SSNM) technology.

Based on the results of the crop cut activity presented, the SSNM produced a yield of 8.7 metric tons while 7.25 metric tons were produced from farmers' practice. At an estimated buying price of 21/kg of dry maize, SSNM has a gross income of P182,070.00 and P152,250 for the farmers' practice giving a difference of P29,820.00.

Aside from the results that pleased the Villasinian farmers, Municipal Mayor Nonato Abrenica pledged to buy

wet corn at a price not lower than P15.50 depending on the quality of the corn as a means of extending help to farmers.

"Ginagawa namin ito para makatulong ang municipyo na mapataas ang presyo ng pagbili ng mais sa ating bayan at nang matulungan ang ating mga magsasaka na mapataas ang kanilang kita" Abrenica said.

Following the presentation of the result, some farmer-cooperators expressed their gratitude to the Agriculture Department for conducting the activity in their area. They likewise thanked the DA for the interventions they are receiving from the government through the agency.

Corn model farm in La Union

Through DA-RFO1's Corn Banner Program, in collaboration with the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist - La Union and the Local Government Unit of Aringay successfully held the 50-hectare Corn Model Farm Field Day at Sitio Riverside, Brgy. San Simon West, Aringay, La Union on March 1, 2023.

As mentioned by DA-RFO I's Corn Banner Coordinator Ms. Anne Lovelle Dato, the corn production project in San Simon West, Aringay was endorsed by the Aringay LGU through the Municipal Agriculturist Office because first, they have a good source of water which comes from the riverbanks and well.

Second, they plant Dekalb seeds which is just enough for the Municipality, and they will be the one to provide to the corn farmers, and third, they are an organized association/group registered in SEC in which they passed the guidelines provided for the corn model farm.

Present in the activity were Aringay Vice Mayor Ma. Isabel Diaz, SBM Committee Chairman on Agriculture Nelda Mapile, SBM Woodrow Araojo Jr., Municipal Agriculturist Benjamin Magno, delivered their inspirational messages and expressed gratitude for choosing Aringay as the location of

the corn demo in La Union. The activity was also attended by barangay councilors, kagawads, MAO staff, and OPAG staff.

"Ang LGU ng Aringay ay buong sumusuporta sa lahat ng programa ng farmers", said Aringay Vice Mayor Diaz.

Meanwhile, Mr. Emmanuel Serame, Campaign Activation Coordinator at Dekalb Philippines, talked about the company's history and what they do. He emphasized that Dekalb, which is owned by Bayer, is focused on developing innovative solutions to produce high-quality crops.

According to the results of the crop cut activity presented by Ms. Dato during the Field Day, using the SSNM approach is more profitable than using the Farmer's practice, with a gross income of Php125,600 compared to Php111,800, a difference of Php13,800.

Farmers from San Simon West shared their testimonies, and farmers from Rosario and Tubao, La Union, and various barangays in Aringay were also present to witness the corn plantation and share their farming practices and feedbacks.

Brgy. San Simon West in Aringay, La Union is a good area for data collection, as it is compact since the 50 hectares field are blocked. The Corn Model Farm project is practically all free, but there will be payment dues that will go directly to the association as part of their funds.#





\Among the provinces of Ilocos Region, the province of Ilocos Norte was the most hit with damages amounting to PhP2.13 billion or 38.21% of the total region wide damages.

The rice growing municipality of Solsona was adversely affected, incurring PhP17 Million worth of totally damaged diversion dams and communal irrigation systems in barangays Bagbag-Bubuos, Pagpatan, and Barcelona.

After the typhoon battered these areas, farmers struggled to find irrigation water which reduced farm output, yield, and income.

"Our brass dam was damaged. Canals were entirely blocked off and access routes to the dam were destroyed. So, we had a lot of problems back then," said Reynaldo G. Mariano, 58, president of Zanjera SOLPIDING Farmers Association, Inc.

To address this, rehabilitation and improvement of irrigation system projects were implemented in 2019 by DA-RFO1 through funding support from the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Fund (NDRRMF).

Farmers in the municipality of Solsona were granted three irrigation system projects.

In Brgy. Barcelona, Zanjera Capiddigan Jambaro Rumaneng Farmers Association, Inc. was granted 2.4M funding for its improvement of diversion dam intake structure and canal lining.

Zanjera CadonJuanan Farmers Association, Inc in Brgy. Nagpatpatan and Zanjera SOLPIDING Farmers Association, Inc in Bgy. Bubuos received 2.7M and 3.5M, respectively, for its canal lining improvement. Stronger and more disasterresilient irrigation systems were built to reduce its vulnerability to future disasters which provided significant profits to farmers.

"The project was built with good and strong materials," attested Noel Manaran, 49, president of Zanjera CadonJuanan Farmers Association, Inc.

A total service area of 447 hectares were restored from the targeted 376 hectares benefiting 386 farmers in 11 barangays in Solsona, Ilocos Norte.

Additionally, farmers now harvest two to three times annually instead of just one to two times.

The rehabilitation of irrigation projects resulted in an increase of 3,992 kgs. or 103% in rice productivity per hectare from 3,858 kgs. to 7,860 kgs. utilizing hybrid and inbred seeds.



Likewise, the corn production in the area recorded a growth of 17% or an additional 657 kgs., from 3,912 kgs to 4,569 kgs.

In terms of farm income, a growth of 32% was posted in rice net income per hectare and per cropping, from Php47,733 to PhP62,880. Income in corn production increased by 66%, from Php15,160 to Php 25,158 per hectare.

The increase in net income was attributed to the increased yield productivity and reduced production cost on fuel and labor utilized in the irrigation activities.

Farmers also saved an average of 20 hours in facilitating the irrigation of water from the systems to the crops. With the rehabilitation of the systems,

watering for rice and corn per hectare ranges from 2 to 9 hours.

The saved time was utilized by farmers in doing other economic activities such as carpentry, livestock raising, taro "gabi" production and others to augment their income.

Much of the project's success is attributed to the cooperation between farmers and the local government. Farmers had actively involved themselves from the initial construction phases of the project, up to its required maintenance activities at present.

"We have assigned groups and schedules for the maintenance of the irrigation systems," said Ronnie Miranda, 63, president, Zanjera Capiddigan Jambaro Rumaneng Farmers Association, Inc.

Operations and maintenance activities of farmers were facilitated through the general conduct of periodic cleaning and clearing in the canals and surroundings of the irrigation systems. Per agreement, members not attending these activities including meetings are fined. Farmerbeneficiaries also pay an irrigation maintenance fee. Collected amounts serve as a revolving fund in facilitating operations and maintenance.

To date, farmers continue to maximize these irrigation projects to provide drinking water for their livestock, fish production, cultivate taro, and as source of water for household consumption.





17th NOAC kicks off in South Central Mindanao

The Department of Agriculture - National Rice Program (DA – NRP) conducted a Cluster-Wide Meeting and Consultation on Rice Industry Development in the regions of I, II, III and CAR on March 27-29, 2023 at The Monarch Hotel, Calasiao, Pangasinan.

"Let's focus on outcomes, not just outputs." said Dr. Leocadio S. Sebastian, Undersecretary for Rice Industry Development, as he discussed the Masagana Rice Program and highlighted the Four Key Strategies: (1) Climate Change Adaptation; (2) Cluster our Farmers; (3) Value Chain Approach; and (4) Digital Transformation.

Rice related national program activities were also discussed such as the Farm and Fisheries Clustering and Consolidation (F2C2) program, Suitability and Fertility status of Rice Areas in Luzon Regions, and the Location – Specific Cropping Pattern and Calendar both discussed by the Bureau of Soils and Water Management.

Meanwhile, Ms. Analiza Ramos, DA - RFO1's Field Operations Division Chief, presented the Ilocos Region's production performance, targets for the 2023 wet and dry season, Palay farming prices, preparations for the wet cropping

season, best practices, and key strategies for increasing rice production in the region.

One concern in the region is that half of the area of Ilocos Region are rain fed and harvesting season always coincides with typhoons. "This is also a contributor aside from the lack of technology and other interventions if not all areas will be rain fed." Ramos said.

As a result, the panels concluded that collaborating closely with the National Irrigation Administration (NIA) is the best approach.

The event was also attended by the National Rice Program Consultants, Regional Directors from CAR, Regions I, II, and III as well as representatives from various agencies, Provincial local government units, and other private sectors involved in the Rice Industry.

The purpose of the cluster-wide meeting and consultation is to discuss the situation, issues, and strategies for achieving the goal of increasing productivity and farmer income in the Philippines, particularly in the rice industry.

DA-llocos welcomes FAO reps; shows large scale demo on FAW control

The Department of Agriculture-Ilocos Region led by Regional Executive Director Annie Q. Bares and the Food and Agriculture Organization's (FAO) representative Mr. Yubak GC warmly welcomed the second batch of the 13 delegates from the Southeast Asian Geo-zone countries for a weeklong visit in the Philippines in relation to the Global Action for Fall Armyworm Control.

Held at the Monarch Hotel, Calasiao, Pangasinan, the activity signals the start of a weeklong endeavor of the DA in collaboration with the FAO, the Bureau of Plant and Industry, National Crop Protection Center, the local government unit of Pangasinan and the city of San Carlos, Pangasinan as they visit the Large-Scale Demonstration of Fall Armyworm IPM-PAMS Management Strategies and Technologies established at Brgys. Payapa and Bocboc San Carlos City, Pangasinan.

Dr. Constancia Diaz, chief of the Integrated Laboratories Division of DA-RFO I emphasized in her welcome remarks the

essence of the conduct of the scheduled activities of the Geo-zone country representatives where they were able to interact with the Farmer Field School participants to learn the best management options and strategies that they have been doing to manage the fall armyworm infestation in the region.

Showcasing some of the sustainable management and control measures especially on the package of technologies using bio-control agents, other cultural management such as seed treatment, weed management, synchronous planting as well as early detection and monitoring, farmer field school training and some other regulatory strategies, Dr. Diaz noted that the methodology of sharing experiences, technologies and strategies from the participating countries will surely yield a collective defense against fall armyworm.







Meanwhile, Dr. Yubak GC in his opening remarks likewise expressed his great appreciation to the BPI and DA for organizing the event and actively participating in the implementation of the demo field. He also reminded the 13-men delegates to take the opportunity of learning from the many good practices that the Philippines has been doing to mitigate the spread of the fall armyworm in the region.

DA's Senior Undersecretary Domingo Panganiban in his message of support read by RED Annie Bares expressed his concern on the negative impacts that the infestation has to do with the corn and livestock industries. Nonetheless, he expressed optimism that the integrated management strategies that the FAO and its allies especially the DA in the Philippines which embarked in an all-out campaign to manage fall armyworm infestation would bring a positive impact to manage the fall armyworm effectively.

As one of the highlights of the field visit, the DA through the Regional Crop Protection Center in collaboration with the DA-Research Division shall lead the delegates into its Large-Scale Field Demonstration of FAW IPM-PAMS that showcases management strategies and technologies to control the FAW.

The delegates shall also visit the DA's Biological Control Laboratory managed by the Regional Crop Protection Center in Sta. Barbara, Pangasinan and witness the actual field demonstration of the adopter's field at Brgy. Bocboc, San Carlos City, Pangasinan.

The field visit shall provide an avenue for the 13-men delegates to interact with the Farmers' Field School participants in San Carlos City, Pangasinan and somehow share their ideas, insights, and experiences in managing the FAW.

Joining the DA officials in welcoming the delegates is Calasiao former Mayor Roy Macanlalay, who also represented Pangasinan Governor Ramon Guico III.

RDC-1 endorses Php48.3B proposed FY2024 budget

Ensuring that the agency programs and projects are consistent and supportive to the regional thrusts and priorities of the Regional Development Plan for 2023-2028, members of the Economic Development Sector (EdSeCom) of the Regional Development Council met for its 1st Regular Meeting at the Ynad's Place Hotel and Resort, City of San Fernando La Union on March 8, 2023.

Presided over by the EdSeCom Chair, Dr. Annie Bares, heads of the member agencies including the Local Chief Executives presented and discussed their priority development programs and projects for FY 's 2024 that will directly contribute to the Region's development thrusts and

priorities.

A total of Php48,351,652,000.55 worth of projects proposed by the 10 member-agencies was endorsed by the RDC as among the priority programs and projects for implementation in FY 2024.

Economic Sector The ten include member-agencies which among others the Department of Agriculture (DA), Bureau of Fisheries and Agriculture Resources (BFAR), Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), Department of Science and Technology (DOST), Department of Tourism (DOT), Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), Agricultural Training Institute (ATI),

National Tobacco Administration (NTA), and Philippine Coconut Authority (PCA) presented their budget proposal for priority programs and projects that focuses on strategic investments for modernizing agrifishery and agribusiness, research and development, technology as well as trade investments.

Ilocos Norte already had a longterm cooperative relationship with the Chinese government through its sister province, Shandong, dating back its establishment in 2002.#

Meanwhile, Ms. Sharon Viloria, the OIC-Assistant Provincial Agriculturist of La Union in her discussion of the







Collaborative Provincial Agriculture and Fishery Extension Programs (CPAFEP) identified the coffee as one of the major commodities that shall be given priority interventions along with the seaweeds, rabbit, cacao and goat thru PAFES.

According to Ms. Viloria, the province will be improving the production of Arabica and Robusta coffee varieties with the provision of various interventions to the identified partner farmers by way of area expansion.

Among the interventions identified are the provision of quality planting materials, provision of organic fertilizers, organization and accreditation of coffee growers, provision of irrigation as well as postharvest facilities, pests, and disease management, capacity enhancement training, farm-to-market roads, market development, and entrepreneurial support as well as the establishment of



mother clonal garden that shall serve as the source of quality planting materials.

For all these projects, the province of La Union shall need an initial Php757,000 to be taken out from the Region's total budget on PAFES for the year amounting to P3.1 million.

DA-NRP conducts cluster-wide meeting, consultation on Luzon rice industry dev't

The Department of Agriculture - National Rice Program (DA – NRP) conducted a Cluster-Wide Meeting and Consultation on Rice Industry Development in the regions of I, II, III and CAR on March 27-29, 2023 at The Monarch Hotel, Calasiao, Pangasinan.

"Let's focus on outcomes, not just outputs." said Dr. Leocadio S. Sebastian, Undersecretary for Rice Industry Development, as he discussed the Masagana Rice Program and highlighted the Four Key Strategies: (1) Climate Change Adaptation; (2) Cluster our Farmers; (3) Value Chain Approach; and (4) Digital Transformation.

Rice related national program activities were also discussed such as the Farm and Fisheries Clustering and Consolidation (F2C2) program, Suitability and Fertility status of Rice Areas in Luzon Regions, and the Location – Specific Cropping Pattern and Calendar both discussed by the Bureau of Soils and Water Management.

Meanwhile, Ms. Analiza Ramos, DA - RFO1's Field Operations Division Chief, presented the Ilocos Region's production performance, targets for the 2023 wet and dry season, Palay farming prices, preparations for the wet cropping season, best practices, and key strategies for increasing rice production in the region.

One concern in the region is that half of the area of Ilocos Region are rain fed and harvesting season always coincides with typhoons. "This is also a contributor aside from the lack of technology and other interventions if not all areas will be rain fed." Ramos said.

As a result, the panels concluded that collaborating closely with the National Irrigation Administration (NIA) is the best approach.

The event was also attended by the National Rice Program Consultants, Regional Directors from CAR, Regions I, II, and III as well as representatives from various agencies, Provincial local government units, and other private sectors involved in the Rice Industry.

The purpose of the cluster-wide meeting and consultation is to discuss the situation, issues, and strategies for achieving the goal of increasing productivity and farmer income in the Philippines, particularly in the rice industry.



Ilocos region participates in HAPAG kay PBBM nationwide launching

In line with the simultaneous launching of the HAlina't magtanim ng Prutas At Gulay sa Barangay Project | Kadiwa Ay Yaman | Plants for Bountiful Barangays Movement (HAPAG KAY PBBM) on March 1, Ilocos region successfully launched said program at Barangay Casilagan, San Juan, La Union.

The HAPAG KAY PBBM is a collaborative program of the Department of Interior and Local Government's (DILG) HAPAG sa Barangay Project and the Department of Agriculture's (DA) Green Revolution 2.0: Plants for Bountiful Barangays Movement to address food insufficiency and hunger and achieve food accessibility, affordability, and security in the Philippines by having vegetable gardens in the barangay through urban and periurban agriculture and community engagement.

To better understand the program, Ms. Maricar F. Bongais, HVCDP focal person discussed the HAPAG and the PBBM program.

The PBBM o Green Revolution 2.0 o Luntiang Ani ng Mamamayan was launched in October 26, 2022 through the initiative of DA-Bureau of Plant Industry to support fresh food supplies in urban, peri-urban and rural areas and encourage citizens to ensure their own food security and engage in urban agriculture as a potential additional source of income.

Meanwhile, the HAPAG sa Barangay project aims to strengthen the capacity of barangays towards sustainable agricultural initiatives by enhancing and promoting related activities such as barangay community gardens and encouraging households and communities to produce fresh, healthy, and affordable fruits and vegetables from their backyards.

Acknowledging the crucial role of barangays in the success of the program, President Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos, Jr. who led the nationwide launching stated that this program is yet another step towards strengthening the capacity of barangays to adopt sustainable agriculture initiatives even in the small scale.

Apart from the launching, the pilot beneficiaries received vegetable seeds from DA RFO 1 and a short lecture on vegetable production from an expert of Enviro Scope Synery Inc.

Also present at the activity was DILG OIC Assistant Regional Director Paulino Lalata, Jr and staff, Executiive Assistant Atty. Reggienald Ng of the Mayor's office of San Juan, Ms. Harlene Fernandez OIC-Municipal Agriculturist, and Ms. Sharon Villoria and other OPAG staff.





DA in Ilocos provides updates on HVCDP projects to LGU counterparts

Giving updates while assessing their counterparts' performances in the implementation of the programs and projects under the High Value Crops Development Program (HVCDP), the Department of Agriculture in Ilocos Region convened the municipal and provincial HVCDP coordinators and its report officers for a two-day assessment and planning workshop held in Baguio City on January 19-20, 2022.

An annual activity that aims to harmonize the HVCDPs programs and projects with the support of the local government units in the four provinces in the region, the assessment and planning workshop also led to the announcement of new programs and projects of the DA this calendar year 2023.

Ms. Maricar Bongais, Regional Focal Person of HVCDP in the region reported that Ilocos Region has a total fund allocation of P122 million to implement the HVCDPs programs and projects in the region this year.

Of this total amount, P20 million was allocated for the construction of cold storage in Pangasinan in response to its need to strengthen the

onion industry in the region.

Another valuable HVCDP project to be implemented this year is the continuing provision of inputs such as fertilizers, seeds and planting materials, postharvest facilities, machinery, and equipment, as well as irrigation facilities that shall be provided to qualified beneficiaries.

Another valuable project that the HVCD Program shall be launching this year is the utilization of the P100B Coco Levy Fund in collaboration with the Coconut Development Authority which aims to provide support to coconut farmers and improve the coconut industry in the country.

A 5-year development program involving around 11 government agencies, the program provides various developmental projects that were categorized into



seven sub-projects which shall all be implemented towards modernizing the coconut industry in the country.

Of the seven categories, the DA was included in the Community-Based Enterprise Development category which requires the rejuvenation and rehabilitation of existing coconut areas in the country including its area expansion through intercropping with coconut and coffee.

Mr. David John Rondal, the Project Coordinator informed the participants of the assessment and planning workshop that would-be beneficiaries of the program shall have to organize into coops and be enrolled in the National Coconut Registry System to avail of the programs and projects intended for them.

Under this program, the DA has allocated a total of 166 million in its first year to finance the programs and projects which shall be shared by the 15 regions in

the country. Region I's share is P3 million to help farmers with suitable crop areas, have available areas for intercropping and must be active members of the farmers' cooperatives and associations.

Aside from this project, the DA-HVCDP for this year will be launching the Best Gulayan sa Barangay Program which aims to select the best vegetable garden in the barangay.

A project that aims to enhance the capacity of the general public to produce their own food using the technologies in vegetable production, it shall also promote sustainable source of vegetable seeds for household use.

Of the 3,267 barangays of Region 1, a total of 30 barangays are expected to join the Search who served as the beneficiary of the Gulayan sa Barangay Program of the HVCC.

Established in a 600 square meter

area, the vegetable garden shall be provided with various interventions from the DA with the support of the local government units in the form of capacity training, various farm inputs, and other supplies and materials in gardening.

With the project duration of ten months that shall start this February, the Best Barangay Garden shall be selected and awarded in the last quarter of 2023 in time for the harvest festival slated in October or November this year.

Aside from updates of the programs and projects under the Program, the DA-HVCDP is set to conduct a data harmonization with the Philippine Statistics Authority for the fine-tuning of the production data of the various priority commodities in the region under the HVCD Program.



Ilocos farmers receive aggie interventions worth Php33.4M

Thousands of farmers from the 2nd district of Ilocos Norte benefitted from various interventions of the Department of Agriculture on February 3, 2023.

Under the RCEF-RFFA program, a total of 2,135 rice farmers from Currimao and San Nicolas received a cash grant amounting to 5,000, while 535 individuals from the municipalities of Batac City, Dingras, Nueva Era, Paoay, and Solsona and 3927 from Dingras received fuel subsidy and fertilizer discount youcher, respectively.

Agricultural machinery, equipment and inputs were likewise awarded to farmers' associations, and

Pump and engine set, power sprayer, hand tractor, animal zoological Forage chopper, egg incubator, botanical pesticides, nesting baskets, seedling tray, garden shovel and rake, trowel, sprinklers and crates are among the aggie supports distributed.

Present at the event was 2nd district representative hon. Angelo Marcos Barba who assured the recipients of his continuous support to the agri-fishery sector.

Ilocos Norte farmers receive Php41.4M worth of agri support

Farmers from the municipalities of Bacarra, Bangui, Burgos, Pagupud, Pasuquin, Piddig, Vintar, and Laoag City attended the two-day agri-support awarding and distribution event this week, February 1-2 at the Pasuquin Auditorium, Ilocos Norte.

Specific interventions given were 18 sets of gardening tools, 36 bottles of botanical pesticides, 306 pieces 72-holed seedling trays, and 306 pieces 128-holed seedling trays to 18 farmers.

A hand tractor was granted to One Ilocos Seed Producers Association, two incubators with 50 nesting baskets to United Farmer Irrigators Association of Pasuquin, 182 sets of various vegetable seeds to LGU Pasuquin, six rolls of tunneling film to Zanjera Carad Sur Farmers Association , one forage chopper and seven rolls of tunneling film to Laoag City Southwest Corn Cluster Farmers Association Inc, and one pump and engine set each to Ayat ti Pasuquin Farmers and Irrigators' Association, Inc., Zanjera Cadaklan Pasacayan and Irrigators Association, and Burgos Ilocos Norte Corn Growers.

Accessing wider market linkage for Ilocos' high-value commercial crops products, five farmers' cooperatives and associations from the Ilocos Region participated in the Weekend Market at the Bonifacio Global City in Taguig, Metro Manila on Feb 18-19, 2023.

Selling around P272,000 worth of high-value crops products that include among others lowland vegetables such as tomato, eggplant, bittergourd, bottlegourd, onion, and pigmented rice, the marketing event opened doors for the five FCAs to introduce their various high value crops products to new customers in highly urbanized areas like De Jesus Oval and 5th Avenue Bonifacio High Street and Bel Air in Makati City.

Joining the marketing event is the Tugui Grande Farmers Association of

Bani, from Bani Pangasinan which was able to sell 800 kilos of salad tomato, 620 kilos of diamante max tomato, 100 kilos of eggplant, 18 kilos of squash, 20 kilos bittergourd and 82 pcs. bottlegourd.

The Ricebis Bayambang Agriculture Cooperative from Bayambang Pangasinan also has sold out 100 kilos of pigmented rice at P60 (red rice), P100 (black rice), and P150 (special rice) per kilo.

DA Region 1's Agribusiness and Marketing Assistance Division said that the institutional buyer, the Sakahon Marketplace, Inc., and Ms. Gallardo agreed for the purchase of the onions at a farmgate price of P165 per kilogram.

Aside from the two tons hauled yesterday, additional 4.5 tons of onion will be transported by the KADIWA truck on January 24, 26 and 28.

Gallardo has sought the assistance of DA for the marketing of their onion harvest as she now took over the responsibility of tilling their farm since the death of her husband, an onion farmer who, in 2021, took his life after suffering losses incurred due to harabas infestation of his onion farm.
